Use the Guide to Disability Rights Laws. Create a survey tool of your school building, school athletic facilities, a public park or a community owned ball field.

Evaluate - How well is the facility adapted to the needs of a disabled person?

Assess

Create a physical plant survey. You may focus on one kind of disability or be general. (Visual impairment, hearing, intellectual, physical)

Get permission from a facilities supervisor before actually conducting the inspection. Offer the report to the person in charge of the facility when you have completed it.

Conduct the inspection. Rate how well the physical setting has been adapted to meet the needs of the disabled.

Action

Report to the person in charge of the facility when you have completed it.

In the case of a school, report your findings to the student body and the administration.

Is there an action the students can take to remedy a problem?

Create a student action plan. Set a <u>SMART goal</u> - (<u>Specific</u>, <u>Measurable</u>, <u>Attainable</u>, <u>Results oriented</u>, <u>Time related</u>.)
